

## Letter from the Rector of Burghill Benefice



Dear All,

### **What lies beneath?**

I have always been fascinated with what it means to be human - indeed, what it means just to be (*esse*). There are many questions concerning these kinds of questions which befog our understanding of the essence of humanity. Nevertheless, I am firmly of the conviction that, as the great Socrates famously said: “the unexamined life is not worth living”. It is a constant endeavour of humanity to explore what life means and discover our own unique and valued contribution to it. There is nothing more valuable or important in life which we must not mistake for our things. If we do, we exchange, as if it were gold for worthless dust. Life must be treasured and honoured, we must think about it and discover the ends as well as the origins of our destiny.

If I take what I know about myself, I have found that the first mistake I made about life was not to engage with it, rather just see it as a series of meaningless moments that lead nowhere and to nothing. This is, as I look back, my state of un-examination. There is also I fear another mistake that we can make in life, and that is to make ourselves what we choose without any regard for what is the nature of our “unique” qualities. We may think we are the master of our own life, but we are not. We are constrained by what we are and how we are. We must first examine ourselves before we can make progress. We all make the mistake in youth, that we spend too much time exploring our idols and heroes and wanting to be them rather than explore ourselves and become us. We all did that!

I believe that in this quest for discovering what lies beneath who we are, flows from the reality of God’s own life. The life that holds all life and there resides that answers to who we are, and what our life is about. It is not a series of meaningless moments, like pearls on a string, it is one great pearl, of incalculable value and has no end to it. Once we place ourselves before the life of God, we can know that life has no end to it. That frees us to discover what to do with our time, to be what God has for us to discover about us. What lies beneath? That’s between you and God!

**OPENING OF HOUSEHOLD RECYCLING CENTRES:**

From Monday, 14<sup>th</sup> September you need to book an appointment and receive a pass before visiting any of our Household Recycling Centres :

<https://capublic.worcestershire.gov.uk/WasteSiteBookingPublic/>

This is to prevent regular queuing and congestion around these facilities.

Booking is now possible on the same day you wish to visit subject to available slots.

Please do not visit unless it is necessary for you to do so and [read the full guidelines before you visit](#) to see how the sites will operate.

You will not be allowed access to the site without a pre-booked pass

- Bookings should be made online but if you don't have the technology or prefer, you can book a place by phoning the Council on: 01432 260 000 - once through to Waste/Recycling, someone will book an appointment for you but it might not be on that day.
- Booking is available for residents of Herefordshire only
- You will need to provide your address and vehicle registration
- A pass will be provided that you can show on your mobile device or print out
- Residents may book up to 4 slots every 14 days
- Anyone wishing to use a commercial type vehicle or a trailer larger than 1.3m in length will still require a [\(CVT\) permit](#), through separate application
- Pedestrians are NOT currently permitted
- Bicycles must pre-book a slot in the same way as other vehicles

**GREEN BAGS:**

To obtain your green bags, it is basically the same way as for a Tip appointment.

Ring 01432 260 000, once through to the Waste Dept, and after giving some details, you will be given a number, as with the Tip booking and then have times to collect from the main Library:

Mon - Weds, 2 - 4pm

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

For something of fictitious worth.



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Our children are becoming us. Going out is good. Coming home is better!

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
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
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

## FROM THE RHS WEBSITE GARDENING ADVICE FOR OCTOBER

### The Autumn Chill sets in

Although we had some warmer days over September, the autumn is now definitely here for real, and it feels colder. It's a beautiful time of the year, with the trees changing colour. Sometimes it may seem pointless raking, when the wind blows even more leaves onto the lawn, but just think of all the lovely leafmould you can make! It's also time to start preparing for early frosts.

#### TOP 10 JOBS THIS MONTH:

1. Divide established rhubarb crowns to create new plants
2. Cut back perennials that have died down
3. Lift & divide herbaceous perennials - remove stakes and other supports as plants die down for the winter
4. Move tender plants, including aquatic ones, into a greenhouse or conservatory - wait for the first frosts to hit dahlias and cannas before lifting the tubers or rhizomes
5. Plant out spring cabbages
6. Harvest apples, pears, grapes and nuts
7. Prune climbing roses
8. Finish collecting seeds from the garden to sow next year
9. Last chance to mow lawns and trim hedges in mild areas
10. Renovate old lawns or create new grass areas by laying turf

#### Other jobs to do:

1. Plant wallflowers, forget-me-not; Bellis; Primula; Viola including winter pansies and other spring bedding plants in prepared ground or pots.
2. Continue to plant spring flowering bulbs
3. Lily bulbs can be planted up in pots this month
4. Don't neglect hanging basket maintenance. Once they are past their best, replant with spring flowering bulbs, winter heathers, trailing ivies and spring bedding plants
5. Raise patio containers on to bricks or purpose-made pot feet to avoid them sitting in water during the winter.
6. Move alpine troughs to a covered porch or lean-to to protect them from the rain. Pick over alpines regularly, removing any autumn debris and covering died back patches with extra grit to encourage their re-growth
7. Check any bulbs being forced in darkness. If they show signs of top growth and have a healthy root system when knocked out of the bowl, bring them into a cool, light room to induce flowering.



**CATHEDRAL CAFE (from Friday 28 August)** Mon - Sat, 10 am - 3 pm



After holding the position for almost 2 decades, the Very Revd Michael Tavinor will step down in January, 2021. During his time in Hereford, Michael has overseen many changes within the cathedral including several large conservation projects. He has also shared his passion for walking and pilgrimage with the cathedral community and celebrated St. Ethelbert and St. Thomas Cantilupe with the publication of several books. He said, "I had expected to finish at the end of the St. Thomas Cantilupe celebrations, in October this year, but because of the extraordinary difficulties of the last few months, I felt it right that I continue just a little longer." The Dean's final service will be on Sunday, 31st January, 2021 and his term of office will end on 28th February.
