

Letter from the Rector of Burghill Benefice

Dear All,

The Life of a Wayfarer

I have always been fascinated with travel and journey. The other day I watched a documentary on the great Isambard Kingdom Brunel. I was particularly taken with his ideas on overcoming major problems. When he faced a problem, he just kept going. Brunel was appointed chief engineer of the Great Western Railway and when he was building the Bristol to London line, which was the longest railway line in the world at that time, he faced a problem at Corsham. The ground was raised and instead of re-planning things he built what we call today the Box Tunnel. He was a man on a mission, always moving forward with his plans. I have always been inspired by the lives of great people who achieved great things and the thing that grabs me in particular is what drives them. Life is a journey, and we never know what we will discover on the way. The thing I like in this respect with Isambard is that he kept going forwards and he found solutions to the problems he faced. He never stood still, he kept going.

In the Bible, journey is a major theme throughout. The entire thrust of the unfolding saga of Scripture is about moving forwards into new places, discovering new things and exploring who we are in the world with the God who is both known and unknowable. As one of the prophets said: “Truly you are a God who has been hiding himself, the God and Saviour of Israel” (Is 45:15). In the beginning of this story, as they journey out of Egypt into freedom, those who stayed still got left behind. Yet, the biggest journey of discovery was in discovering who this God was? What he was about? If you read the Old Testament, they know of this one true God, but He remains hidden. In the end, God discloses Himself fully in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. But what does Jesus say to those He meets? He says: “Come follow me”. The calling for all human beings is to move forward in life, discover new things about others, the world and ourselves. We must endeavour to triumph over the limits of our former selves and become what the journey is calling us to be. Never think of your life as standing still or as over, you haven’t finished yet! So journey on and greet each day with a smile as every day is an opportunity to journey on and triumph over the challenges you face. The past is over, all we have is what is before us and it’s going to be glorious!

(SSPC) MEETING HELD IN STRETTON SUGWAS VILLAGE HALL ON
THURSDAY, 19TH AUGUST, 2021**

MINUTES:

The minutes from the last meeting held in July, 2021 were adopted as a true record of that meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM - LOCAL RESIDENTS:

At the Chairman's discretion, up to 10 minutes will be allocated for the public to make representations, ask questions and give evidence in respect of any item on the Agenda. Maximum of 2 minutes per person is allowed. Item is not for comment on PC discussions or decisions. Issues raised will be in public minutes and may be videoed or recorded.

WARD COUNCILLOR REPORT:

Cllr Matthews reported that:

- A National Bus Strategy is being looked at which will encourage people to use buses.
 - He felt that there were not enough bus shelters and that cycle racks should be next to bus shelters to encourage people to bike to their nearest bus stop, if this was a more suitable option for them.
 - Herefordshire Council (HC) will be introducing a free bus service on Saturdays and Sundays.
 - He is also encouraging HC to use their own mini buses to transport children to/from school.
- There are currently 4 court cases pending with HC - 2 in the High Court and 2 at Crown Court - all relating to Children's services.
- Back in 2016/17 budget, he raised concerns with HC over City Link Road and Blueschool House over them both exceeding their initial budget.

FINANCE - To consider payment for:

1. Certificate of Exemption: After considering the criteria, the PC resolved that it was exempt and the Certificate was signed by the Chair.
2. Internal Audit Report: The PC considered and noted this report.
3. Annual Governance Statement: The PC considered this, confirming yes to all the criteria and authorising the Chair to sign it.





Dear community members of Stretton Sugwas, it gives me great pleasure to recommence the school's correspondence in this month's edition of Stretton Sugwas News.

At the time of writing, schools are very much "business as usual". Visitors are once again allowed to come in, meaning that inspectors are too. National lockdowns look less likely. All year groups and pupils are in lessons meaning that national test like the SATs are back as well. Despite a certain level of normality within school, the unavoidable spectre of COVID still lingers. Parents, children and staff are still at risk from the virus and schools juggling various members of their team having to isolate seems to be the norm at the moment. One educationalist referred to this term being like the hokey cokey because the pupils are "in out, in out".

Children and schools are flexible and adaptable. Stretton Sugwas is no different. If anything, our school is thriving during this otherwise challenging period of global change. Our school is growing and we have built another classroom onto our pre-school. As a result, we are moving towards single-form entry. This means that we will be accepting 30 children per year group instead of 20. If you have the time, pop past the school and take a look; we currently have spaces if you know of any busy little bees wanting to join our team.

In other developments, our Executive Head teacher, Alex Davies, has forged relationships with another local school, meaning that his leadership now spans Stretton, Burghill and our new friends at Canon Pyon. Again, this shows healthy growth and is an example of what can be achieved when we work together.

In a similar way, I believe working together is key to the future flourishing of Stretton Sugwas school and its community. We are a Church of England school whose ethos is based on the Biblical imagery of the Body of Christ. We each have a unique and interdependent role to play in working together for a shared purpose and goal. If COVID has taught us something, it's that we are stronger together and must look out for the isolated or needy. It's also showed us how important people and our planet are.

Because of this, we have changed our curriculum to very much be one of social action, empowerment and pupil voice. The children have created a social action group (called the B-Team) which we look forward to starting ASAP. Our learning is pointless if we can't use it to help others. Perhaps you might know of anything we can help with in our community or maybe you know of ways in which you could help our pupils?

To the end, to the end, they remain.



FROM THE RHS WEBSITE GARDENING ADVICE FOR NOVEMBER

Winter is on its way

Leaves are falling rapidly, and wind and rain are on the increase. Tender plants will need protecting from frost, gales and freezing rains. Move plants into the greenhouse, or into a sheltered spot, but if you can't, it is worth wrapping plants or pots. Remember winter can be a tough time for birds in terms of water and food, so keep supplies well topped up.

TOP 10 JOBS THIS MONTH:

1. Clear up fallen leaves - especially from lawns, ponds and beds
2. Raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging
3. Plant tulip bulbs for a spring display next year
4. Prune roses to prevent wind rock
5. Plant out winter bedding
6. Cover brassicas with netting if pigeons are a problem
7. Insulate outdoor containers from frost - bubble wrap works well
8. Stop winter moth damage to fruit trees using grease bands around the trunks
9. Put out bird food to encourage winter birds into the garden
10. Use a seasonal bonfire - where this is allowed - to dispose of excess debris unfit for composting

Other jobs to do - general maintenance:

Trees and shrubs:

- Check tree ties and stakes before winter gales cause damage.
- Place healthy fallen leaves on the compost heap or into separate pens for rotting down into leafmould. Shredding leaves first with a shredder or mower will help them break down quicker.

Flowers:

- Do not feed plants this late in the season as they are no longer growing, the nutrients may be washed into rivers and streams by winter rain, causing pollution.
- Apply an autumn mulch to protect plants that are borderline hardy such as Agapanthus, Kniphofia and Phyllostachya. The plant's own leaves, eg Kniphofia can be tied up and used as protection for the crowns underneath. Clay soils can be more workable in autumn, as they are no longer baked hard, but not yet sodden and sticky with winter wet, mulching will help to improve and maintain soil structure.
- Remove stakes and other supports as final late-flowering herbaceous plants die down for the winter.

Lawns: Rake off fallen leaves before they block out light and moisture.






