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

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
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

Devizes & Kennet and Avon Canal cruise

A coach tour to visit the market town of Devizes, followed by a cruise along the Kennet and Avon Canal to see the magnificent Caen Hill flight of 29 locks.

Welcome to Devizes

Devizes is a gorgeous, fascinating medieval town in the centre of Wiltshire, only 16 miles from Stonehenge and 8 miles from Avebury. The centre fans out from the castle with over 250 shops, 5 pedestrian only shopping precincts, 50 Heritage Plaques, 50+ eating places and tea shops, and 14 traditional pubs. There are also 3 ancient churches, 2 museums including the award winning Wiltshire Museum, the “Caen flight” of canal locks and a working Victorian brewery that runs daily tours.



*The **Kenavon Venture** is a 60 feet long and 10 feet wide purpose built public trip boat with spacious seating for up to 45 passengers and is operated by volunteers of the Kennet and Avon Canal Trust.*



A licensed bar, refreshments and a toilet are available on board.

Leaving Devizes Wharf we head west through 6 locks to the cafe at the top of the flight where you will have the opportunity to spend about half an hour viewing the flight and stretching your legs before we return to the wharf.
